




1916 Original Structure

This Prairie style home shares a lot of history with Granville and Denison University. The home was carefully designed for a member of the Shepardson family, the founding family of Shepardson College which ultimately became part of Denison University.

The Prairie style was pioneered by Frank Lloyd Wright about a decade before it was employed by others, including the architect for the property that would become 128 Shepardson Court. Inspired by the landscape of America's Midwest, Wright wanted a human-friendly style that would be inherently comfortable year round. The Prairie style is typically marked by its horizontal lines, flat or hipped roofs with broad overhanging eaves, windows grouped in horizontal bands, integration with the landscape, solid construction, craftsmanship, and careful use of ornament.






1994 Addition – Frank Elmer, Architect

The property was acquired from the Shepardson family by the Thornborough family. It had been unoccupied for some years but the electrical power was still connected and on.

The Thornboroughs wanted to add on to the structure, but only in a manner true to the original architect's vision.

They selected Frank Elmer, a committed critic of the typical suburban sprawl, and one of few fellows of both the American Institute of Architecture and the American Institute of City Planning, to help with their addition. His vision was for an addition that would complement the existing structure and the land.
